

Sarina Community Nursery Volunteer Program

Our nursery is providing plants for the Sarina Koala Habitat Restoration Program. This involves collecting seed from Koala fodder and habitat species, cleaning and sowing seed and then potting on the young plants into tubestock pots. Our volunteers have been helping the Nursery Officer Susie to grow plants ready for this program. They have attended seed collecting expeditions at sites in the Sarina area to top up the nursery seed stock and collect seed from species specific to Koala habitat. Back at the nursery volunteers assist with the task of extracting seed from its fruit or capsule ready for storing or sowing and then potting on the young seedlings into tubestock ready to grow on.

Sarina Community Native Gardens

There are many plants in flower, fruiting and seeding right now in the Sarina Community Native Gardens. It is such a delight to walk through and take it all in. Delicate intricate blooms, large bold vibrant coloured flowers, a variety of textures and hues. Splendid flushes of new foliage growth, tinges of blushing pinks and golden glows or the bare-naked starkness of tree trunks shed of leaves in preparation for the spring burst to come.

- * Cordylines attractively adorned with ruby red berries.
- * The peanut tree with curious capsules containing tasty nutty treats ready for the taking.
- * Clusters of papery lime green seeds pods light up the sticky hop bush like miniature luminous lanterns.
- * Golden hibiscus flowers delight with sweet raspberry jam drop centers, bees devouring the alluring treats.
- * Honey eaters feast on sweet nectar of reddish pink Grevillea flowers.

Sarina Inlet Trail—revegetation in progress

We are delighted to be able to continue revegetation works along the Sarina Inlet Trail, after our successful grant application through Aurizon Community Giving Fund. The project builds on previous rehabilitation activities to enhance the biodiversity and resilience of the native vegetation and habitat along the Sarina Inlet Trail.

Ongoing works including controlling lantana, guinea grass and Singapore daisy are underway and will be followed by planting of 100 native plants when weather conditions are more favourable. Watch this space, as we will be organising a guided tour of the trail for interested community members, before the project finishes in July 2024.

The Sarina Inlet Trail was built in 2005 by our Sarina Green Corps team at the time and in partnership with the Sarina Beach Progress Association and Sarina Shire Council. The 400m walking trail provides locals and visitors a leisurely walk through a variety of coastal vegetation types, between Sarina and Johnson's Beaches.

Fox, what fox? Community meet & greet and surveys, a success!

Our community meet & greet was held on 17th September 2023 at Bucasia beach. It was well attended with approximately 40 attendees (*adults & kids*) enjoying the informative session about foxes and their impacts on local wildlife and what is being done in the region to monitor and control them.

The highlight of course was meeting Rocky & Cooper, Conservation Detection Dogs and handler Tom Garrett (SQ Landscapes) and seeing Rocky in action as he demonstrated his searching skills.

Attendees also enjoyed chatting with Saskia von Fahland (SLCMA), Maria Ferraro (Mackay Regional Council Pest Management Officer), representatives from Mackay and District Turtlewatch and Dan Burndred (QLD Parks and Wildlife Service) while checking out the regional pest trailer and munching on a sausage sizzle. Thank you to our guest speakers who shared their knowledge with us.

The event was followed by two days of fox surveys with the conservation detection dogs, at Cape Palmerston National Park. Targeted areas were surveyed in the Park, where known hot spots and fox activity had previously been detected. During the survey, two active dens were located and fumigated and one den attempt was detected.

This event has received funding support from the Queensland Government's Community Sustainability Action grant program.

Homeschooling group- tour Brewers Reserve walking track

On Wednesday the 22nd of November, SLCMA, alongside staff from Reef Catchments took a group of homeschool students for a walk along our beautiful Brewers Reserve walking track (aka Plane Creek Revegetation Site). The day was a wonderful chance to engage with a new group of people and highlight the beautiful native species that we have the privilege of experiencing in our area, and some of the projects that NRM groups are working on. The walk discussed many of our iconic riparian species, such as the Leichhardt tree (*Nauclea orientalis*), Peach cedar (*Tremma orientalis*) and the Ivory mahogany (*Dysoxylum gaudichaudianum*). We also spoke about the history of the site, highlighting the effects of the restoration works that occurred at the site, which enabled the successful establishment of healthy riparian strip surrounding the Brewers Reserve walking track at Plane Creek.

The workshops were presented by Stuart Myers, acclaimed author, and joint creator with his wife Jane, of Equiculture and the Equicentral System. We were fortunate to have the opportunity to host the workshops within the region, as part of Stuart Myer's Australian Tour.

A massive thank you to Stuart, for his thought provoking and practical workshop and for, inspiring the 33 participants who attend the Sarina workshop, to start re-thinking how they approach managing horses on their properties – for the health benefit of both horse and land.

VegCat Training

SLCMA Officers attended a two-day VegCat training session on 7th and 8th of November in Nebo, organised by Reef Catchments. The theory component was completed at Nebo Hall and the practical session at Homevale National Park.

VegCat is a tool for doing a rapid asset assessment of vegetation and records vegetation rating before and after rehabilitation works such as weed control or revegetation has been undertaken. It is part of the State Wide Indicator Framework (SWIF) which is used by the QLD State Government to measure and monitor impact of revegetation works.

VegCat transect line, Mt Adder

The method used in VegCat is to run a 50m transect line with three 10m x 10m quadrants along the length. Each quadrant is assessed for native perennial grasses, shrubs, and canopy as well as weed species present, bare ground, leaf litter and disturbance by animals. A whole of transect assessment is also completed. The data is run through the program and delivers a health assessment number for the land. The beauty of the monitoring method is its simplicity and ease. The data provided by the tool will be instrumental in reporting and can be used in long- or short-term projects, giving an accurate assessment of success as well as areas which may require improvement.

A big thank you to Penny Scott from Penny Scott Consulting who ran the training. She was knowledgeable and passionate and kept us all engaged with the program, illustrating the potential uses of VegCat and other similar assessment tools. Also, thank you to Reef Catchments who provided the training, accommodation and meals.

SLCMA 'Plant of the Month'

This month's 'Plant of the Month' is the **Grevillea banksia**, **Banks Grevillea** (white flowered variety)

Family: Proteaceae

Name: *Grevillea* after the Right Honourable Charles Francis Greville, parliamentarian and established Royal Horticultural Society in 1804. *G. banksia* after botanist Sire Joseph Banks.

Form & height: Slender tree to 9m.

Leaves: Alternate, deeply lobed, green above, dense layer of pale to rust coloured silky hairs below.

Flowers: White-cream colour flowers

Fruit: Woody, follicles, tipped with persistent style.

Distribution: QLD

Notes: Coastal dunes, headlands; sandy and stony soils. Nectar eaten by rainbow lorikeet and a variety of honeyeaters.

The "Plant of the Month" is currently available from the SLCMA Community Nursery. Landcare members are eligible to receive 1 free "Plant of the Month", throughout that month. This and other native plant species are also available for purchase at \$3.30 each. All plants are grown from locally sourced seed in the SLCMA Community Nursery by SLCMA staff and the SLCMA Volunteer team.

But wait, there is more to do to make this area usable ;) Stage 2 will kick off in the new year, with the modification of the nursery benches to create new benches and, as funds become available the upgrading and extending the irrigation system to a more efficient, effective system.

Beyond this, subject to future funding, our wish list includes upgrading the soil storage and mixing area, re-installing the Wetland Treatment Train, expand the undercover area and workbenches for our volunteers & staff.


