They will be working on a range of projects — working along side and supporting our members, volunteers, project partners and landholders in the Sarina Catchment.

#### **Coordinated Feral Pig Control Program**



Preparations are underway for the annual aerial feral pig control event in the Rocky Dam and Carmila Catchments. The event will be carried out towards the end of the year, after the crushing has completed (dependant on weather and tides). Over 50 landholders and stakeholders within the catchments participate and contribute financially to the event, which has been running since 2008. Over this time, over 1000 pigs have been controlled with a noticeable decrease in damage to cropping and grazing land, as well as natural areas such as mangroves & wetlands.

Those involved agree that **sustained pressure** through ongoing aerial control in conjunction with trapping and baiting is required, to keep the pig numbers and damage to a minimum. ## New podcast about regenerative agriculture is set to ignite change

A new podcast, produced by the Regenerative Agriculture Alliance and Southern Cross University, is set to ignite a much-needed national conversation about resilient farming practices in the face of climate change and drought.

The 'Ground Cover' podcast launches with an episode from 'revolutionary farmer' and author of 'Call of The Reed Warbler', Dr Charles Massy. Hosted by the veteran voice of agriculture, Kerry Cochrane; Ground Cover is a podcast for farmers by farmers. It is a uniquely Australian series exploring real-life stories of land managers who have undertaken the transition from conventional farming to regenerative agriculture. Each week the Regenerative Agriculture Alliance will share a unique and honest conversation about the challenges and opportunities of

regenerative agriculture so farmers can make informed decisions about how best to manage their land. In this Australia-first podcast you will hear from nine leaders in this space. You will hear them speak about the technical changes in their landscape but you will also hear them speak about deeper unexpected changes --in their values, in their connection to land and their economic, environmental and social wellbeing.

## **SLCMA Community Nursery "Plant of the Month"**

This month's 'Plant of the Month' is Mackinlaya macrosciadea, Blue Umbrella tree.

What is in a name? Mackinlaya is named after John McKinlay (1819-1872) a South Australian explorer who led one of the expeditions to search for Burke and Wills and later explored the Northern Territory, macrosciadea form the Greek macros large and sciadion umbel, parasol—refers to the leaves.

**Form:** Slender, often multi-stemmed, open shrub with umbrella-like leaves.

Leaves: 7-18 x 2-7cm, glossy green.

Inflorescences: Large, branched umbels of small white, cream, green or yellowish

flowers; any month.

Fruit: Berries, spherical, fleshy, green turning to a greyish blue when ripe; May to November.

Habitat: Well shaded areas in or near rainforest and riparian rainforest in particular.

**Distribution:** Queensland and Northern Territory.

**Ecological Notes:** Fruit eaten by the southern cassowary.

The "Plant of the Month" is currently available from the SLCMA Community Nursery. Landcare members are eligible to receive 1 free "Plant of the Month", throughout that month. This and other native plant species are also available for purchase at \$3

## Come along to the Soil Symposium and Field Days

The annual Reef Catchments Soil Symposium on Wed 27 November will feature Dr Christine Jones, internationally renowned and highly respected ground cover and soils ecologist. Dr Christine Jones will present on:

- ♦ A fresh look at Microbes the symbiotic relationships that take place in the soil microbiome
- ♦ The extraordinary power of diversity learn how to replicate a productive and resilient farm ecosystem
- ♦ Biostimulants for regenerative agriculture replacing detrimental synthetic N and P with biostimulants.

Complimentary field days will be held on 28 & 29 Nov, at Marian and Proserpine, respectively. Field day 1 will include rainfall simulation, soil pit demonstrations, plenty of insights and in field discussions with Dr Christine Jones on regenerative cropping and, field day 2- Dr Christine Jones together with Farm HQ will discuss on-farm multi-species cover crop strategies, manufacturing compost, soil inoculations and bio-fertiliser applications.



## Reminder: Turtle nesting season is happening now!



at local beach

Marine Turtle nesting season is How can you help? happening now at our local beach-Nesting begins around mid-October through to January, with hatchlings emerging through to April. The main species of sea turtle nesting on mainland beaches in • our region are the Flatback turtle, with fewer recordings of Green and Loggerhead turtles nesting.

#### Major threats to the survival of Marine turtle tracks marine turtles are:

The destruction of nesting habitat by clearing natural

vegetation through beach development

- Uncontrolled vehicle access destroying dune profiles and vegetation
- Uncontrolled beach lighting
- Ingestion of synthetic materials (nets, fishing line, plastic bags)
- Boat strike
- Predation of eggs or hatchlings by domestic and feral animals

- Assume all beaches are nesting beaches
- Never throw plastic bags, fishing lines or other rubbish on the beach, in any waterways or into the
- Keep dogs on a leash on the beach
- Keep vehicles off nesting beaches
- When boating, watch out for turtles
- Protect nesting beaches
- Do not light fires on nesting beaches
- Leave nesting sites undisturbed
- Keep all lighting to a minimum in beach areas
- Report dead, sick and injured sea turtles to the marine stranding hotline

This dedicated group of volunteers, monitor beaches and care for our Mackay turtle visitors covering an area from Repulse Bay in the north of the region, to Stanage Bay in the south. MDTWA operate under the guidelines of the Queensland Sea Turtle Project.

**Did you know?** There are opportunities for you to help scientists gain a better understanding and guide future activities on a particular topic, animal or plant. There are a range of 'citizen science' projects underway, some of which include:

**Roadkill Reporter app,** developed by Mr Bruce Englefield, is designed to take a photograph of roadkill anywhere in Australia with a GPS-time-and-date -stamp. Users can then upload the image to a website. This will enable a reliable estimate of yearly Australian roadkill to be calculated and roadkill hotspots to be identified.

**Echidna CSI** – University of Adelaide and Atlas of Living Australia are on a mission to learn more about echidnas! Where they are, what they are doing, if they are healthy – so they can work towards their conservation. How can you help? By taking photos and collecting scats (eg. poo).
